Abstract

This document explains the formatting requirements for abstract submissions to the 2026 Designing Longevity: Work, Welfare and Innovation in Ageing Societies conference proceedings. Please read this document carefully. You may use it as a template and paste your content directly into this file. Please follow the formatting requirements strictly. Submissions must be in Microsoft Word format. The abstract is limited to one page, including all references.

Use A4 paper. Set the page margins to 2 cm on the left and right, and 2.54 cm on the top and bottom. Use exact line spacing of 18 pt for the main text. Chinese text should be in 12-pt DFKai-SB, and English text should be in 12-pt Times New Roman, with justified alignment. The abstract should not exceed 500 Chinese characters or 300 English words. The full paper should not exceed 10,000 Chinese characters or 6,000 English words.

Leave one blank line after the abstract.

Your manuscript should include both Chinese and English titles. Titles should be in 20-pt bold DFKai-SB (Chinese) / Times New Roman (English). Please ensure correct capitalization in the title; for example, “The Next Frontier of Information Systems” is correct, whereas “the next frontier of information systems” is incorrect. The main text should be in 12-pt DFKai-SB (Chinese) / Times New Roman (English). Section headings (such as “Abstract”) should be in 13-pt bold DFKai-SB (Chinese) / Times New Roman (English) and aligned left. Figures and tables should be placed near the relevant text (or where they are cited in the paper). Captions should be in 10-pt bold DFKai-SB (Chinese) / Times New Roman (English), numbered (e.g., “Table 1”), centered, and placed above the figure or table. The proceedings will be published online; therefore, color figures and tables may be used.

References should follow APA 7th edition style, arranged alphabetically by author surname, and placed at the end of the paper.
